Staffing Updates

I would like to congratulate Mrs Kathryn Lee who has been successful, through the merit selection process, gaining a substantive Assistant Principal position at Kings Langley PS. Mrs Lee will commence her new role from the beginning of Term 2. I know she is very excited about the next stage of her career; however she is also incredibly saddened to be leaving her class, our kindergarten students and Winston Heights PS at the end of this term. To find the most suitable educator to teach KL and lead our Kindy team, I am currently leading an Expression of Interest panel that is open to all NSW Department of Education teachers. Hopefully, this process will be finalised in the next few days. As soon as I am able to, I will let you know who will teach KL and lead our Kindy team for the remainder of the 2021 school year. I anticipate this role will commence at the start of Term 2.

I would also like to congratulate Mr Daniel Gorrie who has been successful, through the merit selection process, in gaining a substantive Deputy Principal position at Northmead PS. As with all substantive appointments, there is a 10 day appeal period. In this case, the appeal period will finish during the school holidays. It is expected that Mr Gorrie will commence his new role from the beginning of Term 2. I know he is very excited about the next stage of his career; however he is also very disappointed to be leaving his class, our Stage 3 students and our school at the end of this term. Mrs Booth with her experience and leadership skills will lead the Stage 3 team for the remainder of the 2021 school year. To find the most suitable educator to teach 6G, I am currently leading an Expression of Interest panel. As this process has just started, I hope that it will be finalised by the end of the school holidays. As soon as I am able to, I will let you know who the new teacher of 6G will be.

We will be saying 'goodbye' to another much-loved staff member today. Mrs Ronda Pringle has been an incredibly compassionate, empathetic and caring School Learning Support Officer (SLSO) at our school for the past six years. During this time, she has supported and encouraged many students to engage positively with their learning and in the school environment. I know everyone in our school community will miss Mrs Pringle dearly. We wish her all the very best with her new adventures.

School Council

For many, many years, Winston Heights PS has had two parent bodies - the P&C and the School Council - working in partnership to support and help improve every aspect of our school.

In formulating the situational analysis for our 2021-24 Strategic Improvement Plan (SIP), we went about evaluating school data, systems, and structures. In doing so, we identified strengths, areas of focus, and practices that might not be conducive to school improvement.

The School Council was one practice that was evaluated through this process. As the purpose, direction and vision of the School Council aligned with those of the P&C, it was suggested that the School Council be dissolved, with personnel provided with the option of joining the P&C. Consequently, this discussion and decision was added to the agenda for the past three School Council meetings, to allow sufficient consideration and deliberation to be made. At the most recent School Council meeting, held on Wednesday 24 March, members of the School Council unanimously voted to dissolve the School Council.

I would like to personally acknowledge and thank the members of the School Council for their dedication, enthusiasm and support of Winston Height PS over the years.

In moving forward, our school will continue to work in close partnership with the P&C.

PRC (Premier's Reading Challenge)

All Kindergarten students will complete the challenge as part of a shared reading program in the Library. Kinder students do not require a reading record. Year 1 and 2 students should continue to record their PRC books and their paper reading records.

During the Autumn break students in Years 3-6 may still record their PRC books online. Go to the student portal https://education.nsw.gov.au and log in with the same username and password they use at school.



Scroll down to the blue section and type in the PRC identification number (on the PRC sticker), the title of the book or author and hit Search. When students have found the book, click on Add to Reading Log. Students can check their progress by clicking the coloured icon next to the Log out tab in the top right corner

Chaplain Chat Week 10, 2021

Anxiety in Children: Last night I sat in a meeting with about 20 counsellors and psychologists. The presenter asked them for their opinions about why there has been such a massive increase in childhood anxiety since their own childhoods. They came up with a list of about 15 different changes that have happened in the lives of children,



families and societies, which have directly effected the ability of children to cope with the demands placed on them. There is no space here to include that list, but I will say that some of those changes are out of our hands as parents, but some are not, such as <u>time spent outdoors</u>. Coincidentally, I heard a Generation Next talk this morning about this impact of the lack of green space on children's and adults mental health. Research shows that even a view of nature has a positive impact on the human brain's ability to relax. (I'm sure this is one of the reasons why I love daylight saving.) I hope you can have a listen to <u>The Benefits of Green Space</u>

Anxious Parents Anxious Kids Pt 1: ANXIETY IS NORMAL (As promised, I'm summarising this really helpful book)

Everyone worries. In fact, it's helpful. Healthy anxiety gets essays written and children to school on time. It helps our kids to move towards things that matter to them. Life would be meaningless without it. Anyone whose life involves performance testify they get nervous every time. But problems occur when anxiety means avoiding unpleasant feelings by avoiding activities. We parents want to protect our children from discomfort but when family decisions start to revolve around your child's fears, your child hears the message that fears are something they can't manage themselves. The key is to allow them to learn how to manage their anxiety by treating it as a real, predictable sensation, and developing a plan for coping. Here are some basic strategies. (More in later issues)

<u>Name it</u> This allows your child to stand back, look at fears critically and note the influential tricks their worry uses. With your child, talk about it as separate from them, and name it. I find worry "sits on my shoulder" and niggles away, so I am going to call it "Niggles". (This name is a little disrespectful too, diminishing some of its power over me).

<u>Expect Worry to Show Up</u>. If Niggles troubles your child, you will have noticed that he shows up in certain circumstances. If you can pre-empt it, expect it, this helps to reduce its power. This shows that you know Niggles is real and unpleasant and gives you the opportunity to make a plan together to manage its impact.

<u>Example:</u> Amy wants to go on a sleepover this weekend, but has never succeeded in staying away. Even though she is keen, Niggles shows up (again) on the day, telling her she should stay home to avoid being scared, sleepless, sick or embarrassed. (She is worrying about worry) Niggles' argument sounds reasonable but you try reasoning with her ("sleepovers are fun", "nothing bad will happen", "no one will know" etc.), promise to come and pick your child up in the middle of the night, or she completely skips the event. These all <u>add to Niggles, power, validating its tricks</u>. A better way would be, together, to anticipate Niggles arrival, and make a plan so she can stay at the sleepover and enjoying her time away. *Please read our next item in Term 2 as there is much to say about this very important topic.*


The P&C AGM is held once each calendar year. At this meeting, all Office and other positions become vacant and then filled by nomination. Any member of the association can be nominated for a position.



To give you a clearer idea of what is involved with each of the Office bearer positions, we have included the job descriptions on the next page.

999-999-999 999-999-999	The Secretary is responsible for carrying out the administrative tasks related to the decisions of the meetings as resolved. The Secretary prepares, in consultation with the President, all meeting agendas. The Secretary is required to attend P&C Association meetings and take notes of the discussions in order to produce a set of Minutes for subsequent distribution to members and for receipt, possible amendment and adoption at the following meeting. (In the absence of the Secretary the meeting should elect a person to take the Minutes, this person should be identified in the Minutes.) Further, the position includes receiving and tabling all correspondence as well as writing and dispatching outgoing correspondence as resolved/appropriate.	 Whilst all P&C members must be mindful of complying with financial accountability requirements, this is the Treasurer's primary responsibility. The Treasurer receives and deposits monies, maintains records, draws cheques* and presents accounts. The Treasurer also ensures that all funds held and handled by P&C are properly and openly accounted for as the Treasurer is responsible for al funds held in the name of the P&C Association. This includes all P&C Association committees. This does not mean that the Treasurer must undertake the actual bookkeeping themselves but they must ensure that the various sub-committee financial records have been kept to the Treasurer's satisfaction. The Treasurer is a signatory on the P&C accounts and should not delegate this responsibility.

The Treasurer should encourage members to understand the state of the P&C Association finances. The Treasurer must ensure a case book or books are kept, recording all financial transactions of the P&C Association.








